Canonical Prioress Election

In the Rule, **St. Benedict** sets forth qualities of the prioress, her role and the process for electing her. This past May, the Benedictine Sisters of Florida held their election process with facilitators **Sister Lynn McKenzie**, President of the St. Scholastica Federation, and **Sister Bernadine Reyes**, prioress of her community in Boerne, Texas.

The election discernment committee chaired by **Sister Mary Clare**, included **Sisters Jean** and **Mildred**. Their work began in August 2015 a series of sessions during which they surfaced goals for the next six years which included awareness building of the mission, activities as well as continuing to be responsive to the signs of the times concerning the use of our facilities and resources.

There were months of community prayer and discernment. Consideration of the individual's spiritual leadership, her particular gifts and the times in which the Order finds itself are also part of the discernment.

We are exceedingly pleased to announce that on May 22nd consensus was reached with **Sister Roberta Bailey** (pictured above with S. Bernadine left and S. Lynn to her right) to serve as our prioress for the next four years!

"S. Roberta's leadership during her first term as prioress made the decision for the next four years easy for all of us," said S. Mary Clare. "She led us through a time of significant change which included the highly successful realization of our six-year strategic plan in moving to a new home to further our mission."

Sister Mary David's 50th Jubilee

Wearing the very same lovely white dress worn for her final vows made fifty years ago,

Sister Mary David Hydro celebrated her 50



years of service as a Sister on April 24th. Her Sisters in faith, friends and oblates were privileged to attend the *Mass of Thanksgiving* with celebrant, **Father Ed Lamp**.



S. Mary David was born and raised in Miami, Florida. She decided early in life that she wanted to be a nun. Graduating after twelve

years of Catholic education, Sister researched communities and decided that the Benedictines would be a perfect match for her.

"My Benedictine vocation is such a blessing," stated S. Mary David to the group during Mass. "I connected and made the values my own: Community, Prayer, Love of Learning, Simplicity, Silence, Peace...a Balanced Life of Prayer and Work." She taught second grade through college and loved being an educator. Sister serves her Community as Sub-prioress, Vocations and Oblate Director and is also a member of the Corporate Commitment, Peace and Justice and Liturgy Committees.

Sister Mary David's Jubilee homily gave us thoughtful words to ponder: "I've learned that life is a process to **Be-come**, to change and grow. Benedictines call it 'conversatio'." She reminded us that our challenge from Jesus is to keep His presence alive and to be a disciple - we must as Jesus' commands, 'love one another as I have loved you'." Relating her life's changes and difficulties, Sister said it has all deepened her relationship with Jesus and made her realize that "only Jesus can really, fully satisfy me."

Extraordinaire




