Can you identify with Charlie Brown's sentiment? What's that you say? Right! We all have our moments when we want to just relax under a tree and gaze on nature. But, then some birds begin dive bomb-

ing each other. Or, a tiny dog yaps with vim at a "couldn't care less" canine. And, just then ago learned tune makes itself remembered, "Love is a many splendored thing." Or a church tune may rise unbidden to our memory: "Where charity and love prevail, our God is ever there!"

We all know people are just plain irritating – especially the ones who don't agree with us. Long ago I heard a poem that read something like this: "To live in heaven with those we love, oh, won't that be glory. But, to live below with those we know? Now that's another story." Indeed loving EVERYBODY is difficult. Even as we sing: "We are fam-i-ly" we look at the person beside or across from us and the thought arises unbidden, "But, I'm surprised you're part of the family of God."

Jesus commands us: "Love first the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." Well, that part sits pretty easy with us. It's that second part: "Love your neighbor as yourself" that is troubling. It's that gray area that leaves me wondering what exactly Jesus meant by "LOVE."

Obviously Jesus made love a priority. He said to love others as I love myself. Do I? Do I give others an "out" as easily as I try to take one for myself? Jesus goes on to say, "By this [love] all people will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another." Notice Jesus did not say that people will know that you are my disciples if you promote my agenda, wear the right clothes, add pithy Scriptural saying to your emails or put the right holy decal on your car. No, our task to BE love incarnated to (and for) the world. To be the kind of love that makes a difference – to be the hands of Christ in all circumstances. Perhaps especially to be that love when it is least expected.

When our community was drafting our Corporate

Commitment we spent much time over the concept of bringing compassion to those in our realm of influence. We word-smithed the statement to reflect our true intention. Were we committing ourselves to impart Christ-like compassion or to be a model of the compassion of Christ? In the end, we realized that we are the hands and heart of Christ to our world. Thus, as Benedictine Sisters of Florida: "We commit ourselves and our resources to respond with the compassion of Christ."

Love breaks down barriers and exposes the heart. In love we act for the benefit of others. People matter so much to Jesus, they ought to matter to us. We seek to embrace the vulnerability love requires. The well-known author C.S. Lewis describes how vulnerable love makes us when he writes:

"To love is to be vulnerable. Love anything, and your heart will certainly be wrung out and possibly broken. If you want to make sure of keeping it intact ... wrap it carefully. Avoid all entanglements. Lock it up safe in the casket or coffin of your selfishness. But in that casket - safe, dark, motionless, airless - it will change! " [Adapted from The Four Loves]

Love gets involved in the nitty-gritty aspects of life. It takes a chance. It does the unexpected, the surprising thing. It can steal your heart but it also leaves a legacy. True love always costs. If there is no cost there is no love. In the end, the goal of our Christian life is love. The measure of our maturity is our love for God and our love for others. So, I invite you to recall a time God surprised you and then ponder how to surprise someone else with a "random act of love." Place your trust in Christ and let Him teach you how to love as He has loved you.

## Community Annual Retreat

The Benedictine Sisters of Florida held their annual retreat July 27th—August 1st. Retreat Director, **Rev. Raymond Studzinski, OSB,** a monk of St. Meinrad Archabbey in Indiana, is an Associate Professor in the School of Theology and Religious Studies at The Catholic University of America, Washington, DC.

## April Aquaponics Training at Holy Name Monastery

#### Exhilarating!

Easter morning's first green miracle happened in the garden. Tiny buds appeared on a persimmon tree we thought was possibly dead yet we still continued to care for it. The spring aquaponics training taught here by **Phil Reasons** started the day after Jesus' resurrection from death and the effects of Easter were evident. Translating peak experiences into words becomes a challenge.

Separated only by a few generations, this class was cohesive in their passion to bring life to others in geographical origins—Canada, Paraguay, Haiti, Missouri, Tennessee, Tampa, Dade City. Intense sessions expanded our knowledge of the perils of industrial farming practices.



"A paradise of information is being taught here." Similar comments of gratitude were made all week by the 14 participants as many "wow" moments helped deepen their understanding and need for sustainable food production. "My blood pH has probably changed this week from acidic to alkaline from our nutritious meals." This comment said in humor was a testimony to our planned healthy menu.

A dozen guest missionaries from an Orlando convention also joined a field trip tour of Phil's newly built aquaponics system in Dade City.

This training could not have been possible without the gracious participation of our generous scholarship donors and of the extra hands of **Janet Collura**, **Tracey Adams** and **Richard Bon**. At the closing ceremony, one person expressed what many were feeling—the presence of the Spirit among the group.



Immediately after the remark a strong wind began to blow and was evidence of God's living and loving affirmation. May each student bring their knowledge to better the world in

Sisters of Florida at Holy Name for a Mass of Thanksgiving. When the delegates had last visited the site, there was only an abandoned orange grove. On this visit the group toured the monastery and new guest wing which was completed in April 2017. The day's event included the Blessing of the new wing and a Mass celebrated by Most Reverend Gregory Parkes, Bishop of the Diocese of St. Petersburg.



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
