Give Day 2018 was also a success and helped us to end the 2017/18 Fiscal Year (July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018) at \$153,660 or 93 percent of our \$165,000 goal.

Retreats

Sister Mary David spent two weeks in Minnesota, June 3rd-16th, conducting retreats for two Benedictine Communities of women.

The retreat title was

"Keeping the Fire Burning" which focused on the fact that Vocations can't be taken for granted. Reflection on Benedictine values stirred the fire to keep it alive and burning. One Sister had a creative idea that at the end of retreat, the Sisters could write resolutions on wood and drop them in a fire pit. Writing and then the fire experience proved compelling for all.



2017 Giving in the US

Director of Mission Advancement, **Faith Pridmore**, CFRE attended Planet Philanthropy in Fort Lauderdale, Florida June 17—19th. The conference is hosted by the Association of Fundraising Professionals, an international membership and educational organization. There are over 30,000 members with about 4,200 holding the designation, Certified Fundraising Executive (CFRE).

One of the educational sessions Faith attended was focused on the recently published report from Guide Star and Indiana University School of Philanthropy. The following represents the comprehensive report takeaways about U.S. giving in 2017 which proved to be a blockbuster. Americans donated a record-breaking **\$410 Billion**, a 5.2 percent increase over the previous year due primarily to a booming stock market and a generally strong economy.

While this milestone year for giving is great news, there is concern: **fewer households are giving** and the gap is being filled by higher income households. The key factors are: the growing wealth disparity in the U.S. and the nonprofit sector's growth (up 23.4%) is faster than individual giving (only up 3.4%).

Other factors that have been unsettling for the non-profit sector are the new administration, a tumultuous political climate, and tax policy changes approved in late December 2017. It is still too soon to know the impact some of these changes may have on giving in the future.

We do know that small charities are being impacted more by this change in donor demographics because they tend not to have great access to high net worth individuals or large corporate donors.

Charities who have built relationships with their donors, are trust-worthy, impact lives, and steward gifts responsibly are typically at the top of donors' lists of favored institutions and the philanthropic industry believes should continue in that space even in an economy that is not so vibrant. It is noteworthy to mention that research indicates people who give to charity typically give to between 4 and 7 organizations. Even in hard times, donors tend to be loyal to charities listed first, second and third on their lists.

The non-profit arena is a tax code, but solves social problems that for-profit organizations can't. I feel privileged to work in this field and am inspired by those served. The meaning and purpose of building relationships is invigorating, meaningful and purposeful. The donors I come to know meet important needs and improve lives with their philanthropy. The entire process of helping others is a labor of love—for the giver and for those on the receiving end of caring. People who give will tell you they receive more than they are giving.

"On career day," she explains, "he wanted to get an application for the FBI so I accompanied him—they gave me an application as well. I filled-out the application and they offered me a job in Washington, DC. It was as simple as that, yet the beginning of a life for which I could never have dreamed."



Bonnie was to meet her dear husband, **Carter**, there. He was a rocket scientist making missiles for the navy. "We married in 1969 and moved to the Kennedy Space Center in Florida to work for NASA. It was a very exciting time as we were working on the Apollo missions to the moon."

During their honeymoon in Vermont, "we had taken up skiing which became a great pass-time for both of us." That would be one of the deciding factors in their eventual move to Denver and Bonnie's work for the FAA. After a few years, my advancement to the U.S. Geological Survey at the National Earthquake Center took us to Golden, Colorado. This was a dream life that afforded us the opportunity to ski all over the United States and Europe during the next 35 years."

"It's funny, Sister Irma would not believe that I am sewing because Home Economics was not a strong sub-


