The Benedictine Sisters of Florida at Holy Name Monastery, like many religious, are enthusiastic patrons of the arts. The monastic commitment to manual work balanced with prayer is conducive to the development of our God-given artistic talents. Like monastics down through the ages, we pay great attention to an aesthetic sense that honors beauty and harmony as attributes of God. In this issue of the TIDE we are focusing particularly on musical gifts, but remember we have Sisters who are gifted in other arts. The quiet environment in monasteries cultivates a climate for rich creative expression in a variety of art forms.

For untold years, music has been a means of focusing the mind and body, facilitating meditation and prayer across language and culture. Shared songs and chants can draw people into a state of alert devotional stillness in many sacred traditions. To enhance the liturgy and periods of prayers that characterize our life together, monastic musicians create arrangements and plain chant (also called Gregorian chant) for psalms, antiphons and Scriptural passages. Chants that make up a large portion of our Liturgy of the Hours require a sincere effort by each individual singer to blend her voice with the group ... no divas here. The intent is to unite hearts and voices into a single community voice.

Music has been a part of our community life since 1889 when our first Sisters came from Pennsylvania. In those days music lessons were customarily reserved for the rich kids. But in our academy for girls **Mother Dolorosa**, first superior and principal, insured that all the girls were exposed to good music, learned to sight-read, sing and play a variety of instruments. We (yes, I am an alum of our academy) studied Gregorian chant and took some form of music lesson – voice, piano, organ, violin.

In the days when the boys at St. Leo Prep (run by the monks at St. Leo Abbey) and the girls at the academy rarely saw each other except for dances at the lake house, the two groups came together at least once a year to delight their audiences with performances of operettas such as *Pirate of Penzance* and *HMS Pinafore*. The May festival each year was performed outdoors on a basketball court where the parking lot now stands in

front of Marmion-Snyder Residence halls. The girls interwove colorful ribbons around the May pole to the melody of "Beautiful Ohio."

New Sisters joining the community were instructed in the technique of blending voices for gentle singing of chant and practiced often and sometimes LONG, learning to sing two and three part hymns. One summer we had a guest professor who tried his best to help even the musically challenged to perform a 12-part choral arrangement.

Upon moving into our new house In August 2014, we quickly realized that the chapel acoustics are meant to be shared. It is a perfect setting for concerts. So, since December 2014, the Benedictine Sisters of Florida have been pleased to host a series of concerts. It seemed fitting that the children from St. Anthony School would be the first to share their musical talents in this space. You see, our Sisters came to FL from PA in 1889 at the request of the pastor of St. Anthony Parish to teach the children in their little school. The Sisters also ran an academy for girls in which music and drama were an important part of their cultural experience. So much so, that all their early schools had an auditorium where the students performed band concerts, musical presentations and student-written productions.

The January concert was presented by **Piney Grove Men's Gospel Choir.** For many years members of that community were employed by the Benedictine Sisters. They worked in our day care, our health care, Marmion Cafeteria and the monastery kitchen; were part of the house cleaning, maintenance and lawn care and laundry staffs. So, you see they fed us, cleaned with us, cared for children and our elderly, and sometimes our dying Sisters. Back in 1911, members of the local African American community were the main work force that helped move the original 3-story, wood-frame convent from San Antonio to the shores of Lake Jovita.

As our community became fewer in number and we sold service centers like the dorms and the cafeteria to the college, we gradually required fewer employees. But in the "heyday" of our relationship we had a custom of going to Piney Grove once or twice a year to a Sunday service at Piney Grove – I think it was called "Women's Sunday." We would offer a hymn during the service and afterward we'd be seated at a special table to enjoy a sumptuous dinner. In exchange, we welcomed the

Piney Grove choir to our Sunday service where they rocked the walls with choral presentations we just cannot match. This past January we hosted another such performance here in our chapel. When it was our turn to offer a couple hymns, Sister Roberta remarked: "We are certainly glad that this is not a sing-off or an episode of <u>The Voice</u> (TV show)!"

In February, Saint Leo University "VOICES of CHRIST," directed by Richard Jimenez presented an hour of praise. March's concert featured St. Mary's Episcopal choir. Aside from their excellent performance, from the first moment we were intrigued by two things. Their director, Sharon Blutz-Bell led in the procession carrying 3 double-bells in each hand ringing ONE bell at a time. With the choir in place, Sharon sat at the keyboard with an I-Pad displaying her music!

For several years now the Sisters have joined with the choir from St. Mary's Episcopal parish to go Christmas



caroling at the hospice house and at two nearby nursing homes. It is touching to see people who are in various stages of ill health, who have had strokes and cannot speak, people suffering from memory-loss but who smiled and actually began to sing the Christmas carols they had learned in childhood.

The St. Mark's Singers, under the direction of John-Paul

Cappa, provided a program of glorious Easter music. The concluding concert in May was a *HYMN-ALONG* with the audience joining in singing several all-time favorite Christian hymns. Each monthly concert was followed by a social with refreshments provided by some of our faithful volunteers and monastery tours by the Sisters. It is a lovely way to spend a Sunday afternoon.

Our guests left with a "song in their hearts" and very often on their lips. Have you noticed that liturgical (church) music frequently pops into your head, and you find yourself randomly singing or humming a hymn tune at the most unexpected moments. The music sticks with us and comes across our lips without warning. Familiar tunes or a new catchy melody goes out from church with us into the world, whether or not we want it to. At liturgy, we become what we sing.

This quote from **Bishop Charles E. Johnson** aptly expresses what music means to our community: "Music, like prayer, has a way of building our faith, and those songs have a way of taking us back and causing us to remember what the Lord has done and what he's going to do, and what he's capable of doing. It is a way of saying 'thank you'."

Through her perpetual monastic profession, Sister follows tradition by making a gift of herself to God. It is a solemn promise to God of stability, fidelity to the monastic way of life, and obedience. Her commitment to the Benedictine Sisters of Florida is part of the vision for our future.

Sister Elizabeth chose for her theme – What can be sweeter to us than the voice of God inviting us? And as Sister Mary Clare Neuhofer, OSB, Scholastic Directress reflected during the liturgy, "Sister Elizabeth heard the voice of God calling her to religious life, to follow Christ more closely and has responded wholeheartedly. 
the professors who teach, the staff and the campus.
