

Lessons from the School of the Lord's Service



Father John Shimkus, O.S.B., the director for our retreat this summer, is a monk of St. Benedict Monastery, Oxford, Michigan. Trained in spiritual direction and formation, Father John participates in his monastery's formation committee, conducts both pri-

vate and conference retreats and serves as a spiritual director, primarily for permanent deacons and those in training for this ministry. He also serves as his community's oblate director, financial administrator and music director.

In considering the theme for the Benedictine Sisters' Retreat, I asked **Sister Roberta** what the Sisters would think might be of service to them. The collection of ideas she offered suggested to me a community-oriented approach, perhaps highlighting the great benefits and also the challenges of living together and seeking God together in the monastery. Not surprisingly, the many teachings that St. Benedict offers in this area came to mind and also his description of the monastery as "a school of the Lord's service" (Rule of Benedict Prologue 45), a place where we learn not only to live together in relative peace, but to really see the sacredness of communal living. Community well-lived makes Jesus present here and now, and also "leads us all together to everlasting life" (Rule of Benedict 72:11).

As the days of the retreat progressed, I became more aware of the somewhat diverse lifestyles of the Sisters and their guests. Many of their lives were not centered on monastic living, but on apostolic ministry or various family situations. So I began to more clearly affirm the holiness of each and every vocation; that the way each person is being led constitutes the "Lord's School" for them; that the same lessons can be taught by different kinds of community experiences; and that the most important factor is our faithfulness to the call of a God who is always and everywhere faithful to us!

A great sense of renewal was mine after our Summer Retreat. The highlight for me was Father John's explanation of "The 12 Steps of the Ladder of Humility." A prime example is Jesus' humble washing of the disciples' feet - the work of the lowliest of servants (John:13:1ff). To climb the Ladder of Humility we need to: have awareness of God's presence within us; surrender one's will; be obedient to God; be patient and steadfast; have self-knowledge; confess our wrongs; be content; accept what and who we are; avoid individualism; embrace the spirit of silence; moderate laughter; be humble in speech. Climbing that Ladder means we are climbing down to earth and humbling the self. It is then that Total Transformation takes place within us and we unite with God.

A Retreatant's Story

Peaceful. Welcoming. A restful environment. These are just some of the words to describe Holy Name Monastery and the Benedictine Sisters of Florida when reflecting on my experiences during a private retreat there. Upon arriving, I immediately noticed the utter stillness and calm of the place which was perfect for my troubled

soul. I was not in a very good place emotionally in my life. There had been several loved ones pass away during 2018, and the most recent one was my Grandma Rita. My parents did their best, but it became apparent something deeper was needed. It seemed that I was in the midst of a spiritual desolation, a term whose meaning was not understood until finding myself dealing with it.

A good friend of mine, suggested a retreat. I found Holy Name Monastery on Google and made a reservation. What to expect or what to get out of a retreat was a guessing game. It turned out to be a Holy Spirit-led immersion experience into the Benedictine way of life. I jumped in with both feet: Liturgy of the Hours at 6:30 am and at other times throughout the day; meals with the Sisters; Sisters' Sunday Family Night; gardened with Sister Mary Romana; volunteered at Daystar Thrift/Food Bank; filled in as a receptionist; stuffed envelopes; attended an Oblate meeting; watched my first baseball game (the Sisters are big fans of the Rays); and listened to their stories. It was especially thrilling to make 105 Origami butterflies for Sister Helen's 105th birthday!

Despite the flurry of activity, it had a very calming effect on me. I was able to gather my thoughts and at the same time quiet my mind. This first retreat experience set the bar very high for other retreats in my future.

Most importantly, I found God's presence palpable in that place and with each of the Sisters. To again practice my Catholic religion with confession and communion after some ten years was a blessing.

Friendships that will last for years to come were made on that visit. Sister Mary Romana gave me some mementos so as not to forget the Sisters and my renewed faith in God. One was a prayer card with the picture of **St. Francis of Assisi.** It included his "Prayer for Peace," which begins "Lord, make me an instrument of Your peace..." This was my Grandma's favorite prayer. For me, Sister's gift was a clear sign from my dearly missed Grandma that she was still watching over me from heaven and it was through her intercession that I found Holy Name.



My departure was one of reconciliation with my faith. Peace, rest, and renewal along with the amazing, loving, and supportive women at Holy Name strengthened my journey towards wholeness. Their continued prayers keep me on that journey.

Karen Humphreys Oblate and Supporter

A cradle Catholic, **Karen Humphreys'** early life was immersed in all the things Catholics were supposed to do, most especially the sacraments. "Becoming a nun," explains Karen, "was an early aspiration, but would not come to be. I am blessed today though to have become an Oblate at Holy Name Monastery!"

Karen's parents, Elaine and Robert Humphreys, and her sister Joan all lived in Eris, Pennsylvania. Her mother (pictured to Karen's right) worked as a dental



hygienist and then later as a gemologist. She specialized in diamonds and that career enabled Elaine and Bob to put their girls through college. Joan became an architect with her own business in New York City and has one son.

Karen studied abroad in her junior year of college in Paris and would eventually become fluent in French. Her career was in international business which gave her opportunities to travel. Employed by Fisher-price, Fruit of the Loom, and Closet Maid, she traveled to 47 countries including six continents. "My travels to Mexico, Puerto Rico, and Latin America," says Karen, "elevated my early Spanish education to fluency."

Probably one of her most interesting trips was starting in Russia in 1989 which was still very atheist. "You could feel that with the people. My next stop was Israel and the feeling was exactly the opposite—the state is their religion and vice versa. The exposure to people of such differing cultures, languages, and religions has helped my humanity. I didn't realize it as the experiences were lived, but I came to believe that God was instilling in me love for Him through the diverse projections of Himself. "

God does work His many ways in our lives. During her working years, Karen was laid off several times. "It caused me to depend on the Lord for decisions to move forward. One such instance was the offer of a position in Gainesville for which I didn't feel qualified. God helped me through that challenging decision and the job ended up being fun and very rewarding, both professionally and

financially. I also found a wonderful parish there, Queen of Peace, which brought me closer to God.

Karen's Spiritual Director at the time suggested she consider a 3rd Order. After some research, it was the Benedictine Sisters of Florida at Holy Name Monastery she would visit. "One of the initial impressions that highly impressed me was the Sisters' involvement in the community and dedication to people of all religions and backgrounds. It is awe inspiring to realize how they have surrendered to their humble and giving way of life."

As she became involved in the Oblate Program, Karen knew she found a place to fulfill her spiritual needs. She sees it as not only cherished spiritual time, but educational as well. "We read and discuss principles and values together. The **Rule of Saint Benedict** has brought such enlightenment to me. His thoughts about prayer and work—that work is prayer; living a balanced life with simplicity, humility and with God's help—have affected me greatly. Being around the Sisters and seeing their loving outreach to others has helped me grow closer to God."

"While I don't make it to all the Oblate meetings, I try. The peace and kinship felt when there is palpable. For all that they give and do, I am moved gratefully to support the Sisters."


