

Lessons from the Mystery of the Eucharist

Lessons from the School of the Lord's Service



Father Patrick Boland, O.S.B., the director for our retreat this summer, is a monk of Subiaco Abbey, Subiaco, Arkansas. Father Patrick is trained as the Safe Environmental Coordinator for Subiaco. Father Patrick prays that his years of

experience in practicing and providing a safe environment for minors is effective in preventing any future incidents of child abuse in any form, but in particular child sex abuse. Father Patrick conducts both private and conference retreats.

The Benedictine Sisters of Florida made their annual communal retreat July 24 to July 29, 2022.

The Retreat Director was Father Patrick Boland, OSB from Subiaco Abbey in Subiaco, Arkansas. The title of Father Patrick's Retreat was "The Mystery of the Eucharist". The presentations were centered around the document "The Mystery of the Eucharist in the Life of the Church", published by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops in 2021 (see https://www.usccb.org/resources/mystery-eucharist-life-church)...

Father Patrick began the retreat by citing a survey done by the Pew Research Center showing that 69% of Catholic respondents believed that the bread and wine offered at Mass are only symbols of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. Only 31% believed the teaching of the Catholic Church, that is, the bread and wine become the actual Body and Blood of Christ at the Consecration. (See One-third of U.S. Catholics believe in transubstantiation | Pew Research Center). The UCCB document was written in response to those results.



It is not possible to summarize Father's presentations in a few words. Here are a few "snippets".

Father cited Scripture. He reminded us that Jesus promised "I am with you always, to the end of the age" (Mt:28:20). For us as Roman Catholics, Mass is not just the recollection of a past event, it is also "a celebration of the living presence of the Risen Lord in the midst of his own people." (UCCB)

In another Scripture passage Jesus told his listeners that they must eat his flesh and drink his blood to have life within them (John 6:48-67). When his listeners began to protest ("How can he give us his flesh to eat?") Jesus repeated what he said, insisting that they must do so in order to have eternal life. In saying this Christ was promising to nourish us with his very self. He does so in the Eucharist where we receive the flesh and blood of Christ.

Father Patrick also quoted St. Teresa of Calcutta who said, "When you look at the crucifix you see how much Jesus loved us then. When you look at the Sacred Host, you see how much Jesus loves you now."

Father Patrick's presentations reminded us of the great gift that the Eucharist is to us and to the entire Church. We are grateful to him for coming to Holy Name to share his wisdom with us.

Psalm 23 ~ The Lord is my Shepherd



My favorite Psalm is Psalm 23 The Lord is my Shepherd.

Psalm 23 was written by King David who grew up tending sheep as his father

was also a Shepherd. In this Psalm, David expresses his great confidence and delight in the constant protection and guidance of a loving God. David referred to God as his Shepherd and himself as the sheep. I believe David means that God will watch over us just as the shepherd watches over the flocks.

The psalm uses the metaphor of a shepherd's care for his sheep to describe the wisdom, strength, care, protection, love, and kindness of our God.

Psalm 23 is one of my favorite psalms because this is the first psalm which I learned by heart as a preparation for my first holy communion when I was in second grade. I took a lot of trouble to learn by heart. Learning of this Psalm 23 is sure to leave me feeling secure and wrapped in God's loving arms. This Psalm for me is a prayer of trust in God's divine protection. And this Psalm has been a constant companion where my journey takes me in life.

I would like to share here, my short reflection on this Psalm 23.

The LORD is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want (Psalm23:1): It brings me comfort in my greatest times of need and reminds me of the care and protection of my Good Shepherd.

The Lord makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. (Psalm 23:2-3): The Lord helps me to be still in His presence so that He can bring peace and refreshment to my soul. The Lord provides strength for my weary heart, enables me to walk forward on my journey and restores my soul. The Lord leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me. Your rod and your staff, they comfort me. (Psalm 23:4):The Lord

guides me into righteousness so that I may do everything for the glory of God. Even though I may walk through dark times, I trust that God is with me even there. It is in those times where I press into Him, spending more time in His presence. As long as I am walking in the ways of the Lord, his power and protection abide with me.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows, (Psalm 23:5): I will have trials, but if I feast on His word, and learn to be still in His presence, it makes me walk through those times much easier. The Lord anoints me and chooses me to serve Him. The Lord provides abundant blessings to me, too many to count! My cup is always full. The Lord has blessed me abundantly and I have so much to be thankful for.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me, all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever. (Psalm 23:6) The Lord's goodness, mercy and unfailing love will pursue me all of my life journey. With this great confidence in God's continued favor in my life, no form of opposition of fear will diminish my faith in God's ability to meet my needs. And I am sure that the Lord provides a place for me to dwell with him forever!

THE GREAT JOY OF PSALM 96

Which psalm is my favorite?

I have no definitive answer for all time, but I can speak of my favorite psalm on the day I began writing this essay. It was Psalm 96. When looking for a line for morning lectio, these lines jumped out at me:

"Let the heavens rejoice and the earth be glad

The sea and all within it thunder praise

The field and all it bears rejoice

presence of the Lord!"

This lovely imagery reminds us of the sacredness of all God's creation, reminding me of one of my all-time favorite lines, from Ps 98: "Let the rivers clap their hands!"

Psalm 96 states that the Lord is "to be feared above all gods." I found two important ideas here.

"All gods" reminded me that religions were initially polytheistic. Then, the monotheistic religions emerged. Stages of wisdom give way, one to another. Another example of this kind of transition is the Old Covenant giving way to the New Covenant.

Then, there is "fear of the Lord." They say "fear" is not an exact translation, and that there is an element of "awe" in the meaning, but I think "fear" is a good translation, because it is so powerful. "Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom," Psalm 111 tells us. I think that says it perfectly.

What I loved most about Psalm 96 is that it tells of great joy, joy for God's splendor, majesty and grandeur, and joy for God's salvation and wondrous deeds. Psalm 96 is all about joy, pure joy.



Then, I wondered, what could be the occasion for all this joy?

Therefore, I turned to THE DAILY BIBLE, a remarkable book, which I have been studying for the past couple of months. In this book, Professor F. LaGard Smith has arranged the verses of the Bible in "chronological" order, skillfully "ironing out" duplications, without

losing any details. When he finds a place in the ongoing narrative to insert specific psalms, this technique is brilliant!

In THE DAILY BIBLE, Professor Smith inserts Psalms 52, 54, 56, 57, and 59 into the first book of Samuel, exactly where they belong. When you read how King Saul, out of jealousy, turns on his loyal servant David and begins trying to kill him, and you read David's words in these psalms, you are reading drama as great as anything in Shakespeare.

Now, in conclusion, what is the answer to the question about the occasion for the great joy of Psalm 96?

In THE DAILY BIBLE (as in other commentaries), Psalm 96 is All the trees of the forest shout for joy -- at the said to describe the joyous day when King David triumphantly brings up the Ark of the Covenant to Jerusalem.

More is not better. Too often we can read or recite psalms without thinking what we're saying or listening to what God is saying to us. We can't just be putting time in and speaking "Babylon".


